

Context

Located in NE Seattle's wealthy Laurelhurst neighborhood, Pathways Park is situated within a microhood very different than the census data would suggest. Adjacent to several special needs facilities and low income housing, vulnerable populations report feeling isolated.

Room to Breathe






Training Grounds

The "Rolly-Polly," while not explicitly "accessible" is imagined as an opportunity for those on wheels to challenge themselves. Working closely with occupational therapists the design team included many features geared for growth.



Social Spaces




Symbols of Belonging

Many marginalized people experience a "belonging gap" where they feel unwelcomed in public spaces. To build a bridge, the design team created a series of symbols like these Rainbow Snags to reinforce a sense of inclusion.



Treehouse

Building on the project's "nature" objective, many students suggested an "inclusive treehouse." Rather than build hundreds of feet of ramp, Pathway's Park includes a cantilevered deck and porch swings overlooking the ravine, accessible from the main path.


Braille Rail

Originally imagined by a student, the design team translated community authored poetry into braille and placed it on the treehouse railing. The poem describes the ravine beyond.




Thoughtful Equipment

Manufactured equipment plays a small but vital role in the play environment. Multi-person swings, spinners, and a custom slide focus on social, dynamic motion, inviting interaction and shared experiences while thrilling adventure seekers.



Prospect & Refuge

The Nest responds to the teenage desire to hang-out and be alternately hidden and also seen. Located just off the main path, the social structure is animated by (5) small sculptures which resemble alien creature nests.





Nature! Art!

Integrating nature and symbols of belonging, site-specific artworks are woven throughout the park, creating special places and hidden discoveries. Guided by the design team artist, artful thinking shaped placemaking and messaging, fostering a welcoming atmosphere.





Playful Recognition

Roots of Recognition is a playful, abacus-like art piece recognizing more than 1,000 contributors to the project. Each person, organization or donor is recognized equally whether they sat in one meeting or donated \$1 million.
